University of Nottingham Swimming Club is seeking a coach to lead and deliver a performance programme for the 2018/19 season.

Responsibilities

1. Lead on the coaching and delivery of 3 weekly training sessions, as well as creating a performance culture within which the athletes can achieve their potential.
2. Provide coaching at competition including BUCS Team Championships and other competitions as appropriate e.g. Masters, regional galas and Notts Varsity.
3. Assist with recruitment of talented athletes to the University (on the basis that they also meet the entry requirements).
4. Assist with the execution of a fair and equitable trials process ensuring that all athletes who attend are signposted to the appropriate tier within the club (performance, development, social)
5. Build a range of appropriate support services into the programme such as strength and conditioning, physiotherapy, video analysis and fitness testing to support the overall performance goals of the clubs.

Desirable Qualities

1. Hold an ASA Swimming Level 2 coaching qualification.
2. Have an understanding of both HE structure and regional/national structure for performance swimming.
3. Available to lead training sessions (term time only):
 - a. Tues 8:00-9:00pm
 - b. Thurs 5:30-7:00pm
 - c. Sun 3:00-4:00pm

Selection Process

As part of our selection process, candidates may be asked to deliver a coaching session to members of the club.

Contract Terms

The one year contract for service is for up to 150 hours at a competitive hourly rate.

This role does not meet the minimum requirements set by UK Visas & Immigration to enable sponsorship of migrant workers. Therefore we cannot progress applications from candidates who require sponsorship to work in the UK.
